"I'm In" FFI Campaign



FI is changing......from the Friendship Force World Conference in Vancouver we learned our organization is in dire financial trouble. Why? Because overall membership has dropped and members who are aging are not traveling, thus less monies to FFI headquarters in Atlanta.

Another source of revenue was the hugely popular Enrichment Voyage cruises, which have been discontinued by the operator; that alone was a loss of \$100,000. FFI will lose about \$25,000 in 2015 and 2016. They are moving again to try to reduce their rent costs.

Those attending the conference had a call to action to join a campaign titled "Are You In?" Attendees were asked to go back to their clubs and ask members to join in the fundraising.

What will the funds be used for? It is a one-time investment for a new website and data management system. Monies must be raised because exchanges have not generated enough revenue to pay for this goal; FFI needs \$40,000 before the end of 2015, and they do not want to borrow. FFI is moving again to reduce their rental costs.



The Friendship Force of Lincoln Board made a commitment at our November 5 Board Meeting to donate

\$1,000 by year-end. Would you like to be a part of this challenge? Remember that your donation is tax deductible. Our club Treasurer, Wendy Horacek, will mail you a receipt.

Make checks payable to FF International and the club will forward the checks to FFI along with the \$1000 FFL check. We want FFI to be able to identify our members' contributions. Discover France Exchange

ormandy, France was a poor agricultural back quarter in 1944 with narrow muddy cart tracks connecting farm communities. The fate of the first "modern" war, a war of men, equipment, supplies, and vehicles depended on this area...how could the Allies keep tens of thousands of soldiers resupplied with no port town and inadequate roads? Ambassadors were spell-bound as noted guide, Michael Phillips, described the logis-



tics and planning essential for the success of D-Day. No one survived between the hours of 6:30 and 8:00 a.m. on Omaha Beach, we are told, but by 4:30 that afternoon, the battle was over. Not only did we visit several military sites and the American Cemetery but also a German Cemetery where war dead are buried two or three to a single plot.

Individuals from Georgia, California, Florida, Texas, Colorado, Wyoming, Iowa, Arizona, and Canada joined thirteen from Lincoln to "Discover France" visiting Paris, Normandy, Mont St. Michel, the Loire Valley, Chartres, Monet's Garden at Giverny. And all the while our group made friendships with each other!

Lora Black has created a program with photos set to French music which our group will share with FFL next year.

Others from Lincoln were, Dorothy Anderson, Phyllis Arth, Phyllis Haley, Eloise Hiatt, Karen Kuhn, Vicki Mc-Donald and Larry Harnisch, Larry and Laurie Ann Scott, Rosie Swanson and Craig and Joyce Urbauer.

All of the vegetables are given away.

Our first morning in Seattle began with a brunch. After brunch we walked to the Space Needle, built for the 1962 World's Fair. Views from the observation deck had us yearning to explore the city and waterways. At the base of the needle is the Chihuly Garden and Glass Exhibit. Dale Chihuly is a Northwest artist of world-wide fame. The fascinating shapes and glowing colors of the museum are breath-taking.

A second especially interesting element of the Seattle portion of the exchange was the visit to the Museum of Flight at Boeing Field. We toured the original Air Force One, the Concorde and the first Boeing 747. The full scale

Space Shuttle in which the astronauts trained impressed us with the small area in which they work.

A tour of the Issaquah Fish Hatchery was a favorite of the group. We were fortunate to be there at the time the salmon were running. One of the facts our informative guide gave us was that the salmon return to their original spawning area by smell.

On our last day in Seattle we cruised to Blake Island for the Tillicum Village salmon bake. We had beautiful views of the Seattle skyline and the harbor. Upon arrival on the island people dressed in native costume greeted us with bowls of clams. We followed tradition and dropped the shells on the ground and crushed them. Before having lunch, we saw fire pits with salmon roasting on stakes. That salmon tasted as good as it looked! One aspect of the Seattle stay was lots of time left open for the hosts to take the ambassadors to places of their choice.

We traveled by train to our next exchange with The Friendship Force of Columbia Cascade. The activities began immediately upon arrival. We toured Fort Vancouver followed by a catered dinner at a hostess whose yard is edged by the Columbia River. This was a lovely start to the busy week. One day we toured by bus part of the rugged Oregon coast

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and the Tillamook Quilt Trail.

We watched oyster shucking at the Pacific Oyster Company. The tour included a stop at the Tillamook Creamery where we had giant ice cream cones in delicious flavors like huckleberry. One day we made our way around Portland's downtown. We used the varied public transportation system including a tram that took us to an area for an overview of the city. There was time to wander through Powell Book Store, the largest independently owned bookstore west of the Mississippi.

A special tour through Guide Dogs for the Blind was a highlight for Ambassadors. The guide walked us through the process of training the dogs and explained how the new owners live at the site for two weeks while they take care of their dogs 24/7.

We were given time to admire and smell the roses at the International Rose Garden, a sensory delight. Row after row of roses greeted us with enticing scents and blazing color. Pittock Mansion is a 16,000 square foot home situated above Portland with a view of Mount Hood. The Pittocks founded the annual Portland Rose Festival and the rose gardens along with being dedicated to civic improvements. We ended our Portland days with a drive along the Columbia River and a sternwheeler

Eating is always an important part of an exchange. Besides enjoying small group dinners, eating at pubs and restaurants, we had two opportunities to eat at the food trucks for which Portland is known. One collection of these food carts is called Cartlandia which has about 30 food trucks. Each truck is independently owned. Lots of ethnic food and even a sweet specialty truck called Voodoo Donuts provided us with many gastric options.

Both exchanges were so well organized that we saw a wonderful variety of interesting places. Although we were busy, the ED's managed to schedule sufficient free time with hosts so we were able to relax and enjoy our new surroundings. It will be a challenge to reciprocate their thoughtfulness and organization.
