The food was as delicious and varied as the entertainment. There were samples prepared and served by people from many regions of the world that now make their homes in Lincoln. Our own



FFL members joined in by sharing foods that represented their cultures. These wonderful offerings filled two large "melting pot" tables.

Komi, a former Nuba Mountain resident and now a Lincoln artist, gave us all a look at life in his homeland with a nearly 200' long display of his photographs. The display wrapped around most of the First Lutheran Church fellowship hall.

The festival provided all participants an opportunity to take a peek into other cultures without packing a suitcase and boarding a plane. The entire evening was a delightful journey for our eyes, ears, and palates.

Scholarship Financial Assistance for Outbound Exchanges

ave you have wanted to travel with our club on an outbound exchange, but felt your financial situation prevented you from doing so? Be aware our club offers monetary assistance. Carolyn Kitterer is the most recent recipient. The amount of the scholarship is limited to 2/3rds of the total cost of the trip, not to exceed \$2,500, but does not cover personal expenses.

Criteria for applicants:

- Support the goals and objectives of Friendship Force.
- 2. Demonstrate openness to other cultures and people.
- 3. Be physically able to participate in all exchange activities.
- 4. Not have previously traveled outside of North America; however, the Board may waive this requirement in certain circumstances.
- 5. Demonstrate financial need (provide a copy of your most recent 1040 tax form (only the Vice President of

- 6. Compose an essay in 1500 words or less stating why you would be a worthy exchange Ambassador.
- 7. Fill out the Scholarship Application form and submit it to our club's Vice President (who is the Scholarship Committee Chairman.)

Meet some Members of the Friendship Force of Lincoln

e are adding a new feature to the FFL Passport. Mary Bryant was looking for someone to interview new members as a way of introducing newcomers to our membership. The intent was to include the write up in issues of the FFL newsletter. De Tonack volunteered to record comments in connection with the Discussion Topic at the monthly "Breakfast and Conversation." Sounded like a good idea since we would hear from new, experienced, and prospective members. Let Mary and De know what you think about this feature.

On the second Saturday morning of every month, FFL members have an opportunity to eat breakfast together and to share little stories about themselves. There is always a topic for discussion whereby we learn something about one another. The discussion question in January was "What is your earliest memory and at what approximate age?" Milt Bayer came up with the earliest "earliest" in which a memory of mom holding him and saying "Here come daddy and Georgie down the road" must have been said when Milt was only two weeks old, according to his mom. Gayle Bayer also remembered being held up to a window to look outside to see a rainbow.

Many of us replied with memories couched in family events at about age 3 or 4. Betty Starr thought sneaking with cousins around to grandma's bedroom to jump on the bed was okay when grandma wasn't at home. Grandma set her straight. Marilyn Watson remembered not jumping on a bed but sitting on a bar stool in her dad's bar. Kathryn Neyens remembered sleeping in a crib with a medal on a chain around her neck. Turning over, she thought the medal was a mouse and of course screamed. Larry Kluck didn't remember mice but instead his dog Sparky. There were other stories involving grandparents, but one member summed it up by just saying "I remember being special at grandma's house."

Sometimes the earliest memories came from just doing something. Lana Novak remembers whistling because her dad did when they lived above his store. Our newest member, Marie Hitz, remembers going down a trap door in the floor of the kitchen to get coal for the stove and visiting her pet box turtle in the basement. Bruce Keim told of riding down rutted roads in an old car on the way to country school and Carlene Keim had memories of building forts with her sisters using old wood planks. Barb Ridder said her older sister always sat Barb in an overstuffed chair to read
