

# WHAT IS JUNTEENTH

f you attended the FFL meeting June 1, at First Lutheran Church, you had the opportunity to participate in a conversation with Larry Williams, Executive Director of the Malone Community Center. He talked about the oldest known celebration commemorating the ending of slavery in the United States.

Juneteenth dates back to June 19, 1865, when word reached Galveston, Texas that the war had ended. (You may have thought the Emancipation Proclamation issued two and a half years earlier already freed the slaves.) After landing, Union General Granger read the following General Order Number 3 to the people which began most significantly with:

"The people of Texas are informed that in accordance with a Proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and free laborer."

Reaction ranged from pure shock, to jubilation. Some slaves and owners were still picking cotton and loading it for market. So many changes. History records the challenges establishing a "heretofore non-existent status for black people in America."

In the early years, little interest existed for participation in the celebrations outside the African American community. Many times obstacles were placed in the way. Still, as many as 20,000 African Americans once attended a celebration at Booker T. Washington Park before the turn of the century.

Later, there was a decline in Juneteenth celebrations due to cultural and economic factors, such as the Great Depression, less education about slavery in schools, and the move from rural to urban communities. Interest in Juneteenth didn't resurge again until the 1960's. On January 1, 1980, Juneteenth became an official state holiday in Texas. An African American state legislator introduced the bill and continues to be active in spreading the observance across America.

As in many cities throughout the country, there was a celebration of Juneteenth in Lincoln. The Malone Center has been hosting this event for over three decades; and each year, they have added something new. This year was no exception. On Saturday, June 17 at Trago Park, 22 and U Streets, there were many family oriented activities, including a health and resource center fair, live music, inflatables and of course, food. Larry Williams invited all of us to participate. Preston Harris of Men with Dreams was emcee.

\*FYI: Our speaker, Larry Williams, earned his B.S. degree at University of Wisconsin and his law degree from the UNL College of Law. Before his current job as **Executive Director of Malone** Community Center, he was director of Lincoln's Commission on Human Rights for over 10 years. He has been a member of many community organizations including No Place for Hate planning group, Lincoln Interfaith Council, Citizens Again Racism and Discrimination, and NAACP.
