

Lunch was served, and we joined the Krauses and Ershovs for a tour of Des Moines. We visited the Botanical Gardens, and then stopped at a lovely café to reminisce and enjoy tea. At 5:30 we were on our way back to Lincoln. It is difficult to describe the wonderful feeling we had. Friendship Force Friends are the BEST!

Great Lakes Eco-Exchange September 9-23, 2009

arrived in Chicago and had dinner with my host at a fabulous French restaurant in her neighborhood. My host lived in a stylish 7th floor penthouse near the Navy Pier. While staying there we went to her neighborhood block party where there were 15,000 people in attendance. (My whole town only has 25,000 people!)

The next day I took a bus and met the rest of the group in Millennium Park at the "Bean" sculpture. There were 21 ambassadors from all over the US and one from New Zealand. The exchange focused on environmental topics such as green designated buildings, recycling, land preservation, and conservation. It was the most educational trip I have ever been on.

After walking through Millennium Park and a tour of the Lurie Gardens, we went to the Museum of Science and Industry. We went through the Smart Home and viewed the Omni-max presentation of "The Mysteries of the Great Lakes." For dinner we were treated to a Chicago style pizza party in a private penthouse on the 92nd floor of the Hancock Building.

On Friday we toured a Recycling Center, a "LEEDS"

(Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certified building and a 60-acre organic farm. A catered dinner was served that evening at the FF President's home in Wheaton. On Saturday we met at the Chicago Architectural Foundation Shop for the "Green Inside Out" tour which was conducted by architectural professionals. The walking tour addressed ways architects have (or have not) taken the environment into consideration over the past century of commercial design in Chicago's Loop.

The rest of Saturday was free-time with our hosts and some of us went to the Celtic Festival at Grant Park. My host and I also attended a performance of the Broadway show "Blue Man Group" and I got my picture taken with some of the Blue Men afterwards.

On Sunday we said goodbye to the Windy City and I rode to Milwaukee with an ambassador from St. Louis. We were welcomed at a reception at the home of Dave Kalan (the organizer) where our hosts for this leg of the trip picked us up. We then got to go to the Indian Summer Festival on Lake Michigan.

Monday we went to the Schlitz Audubon Nature

Center for a program on rehabilitating raptors followed by bird watching and hiking. We went to a gem shop where we learned about mining and processing rocks and gems and to the studio of artisan furniture maker, Charles Radtke. One of the pieces that he had just finished was sold for \$60,000. The remainder of the afternoon was spent doing wine tasting in Cedarburg and we also visited Bahr Llama Farms to see the llamas and the spinning of their wool. A picnic was held that evening at Harrington Beach State Park.

Tuesday we went to the Urban Ecology Center where we helped with a bird-banding project by capturing the birds, weighing them, recording data, and then releasing them back to the wild.

A chili feed was held for us at St. Matthews Church in Wauwatosa and the pastor described the church's green efforts. After that we toured an older converted solar home where we learned about rain barrels, solar heating, and water pumping. In the evening dinner parties were held. Wednesday we took a bus to the International Crane Foundation which was especially interesting after seeing the Nebraska Crane migration



on our FF trip. After a picnic lunch, we traveled to Devil's Lake State Park where we did a hiking tour led by a geologist who educated us on the glacier that went through there. Thursday we visited the Pewaukee Horizon School and joined the students on their River restoration project. That afternoon was spent viewing a rain garden at the Library, a fair trade import store, touring an Indian Community School, and walking on the beach. Friday we went to a presentation at the Great Lakes Water Institute followed by a onemile narrated walking tour on the Riverwalk. Next we went to the Milwaukee Art Museum. This wing-like structure opens up for a wingspan of 217 feet during the day, folding over the tall arched structure at night; it is amazing to watch! To me it looked like the sails of a ship; others think it resembles the wings of a bird. Our ambassador from New Zealand had her son come speak to us. He was one of the architects on this amazing building. The best part of the day was sailing on Lake Michigan as guests of the South Shore Yacht Club. They had a social hour and fish fry for us afterwards. A farewell party was held at Kochanski's Concertina Bar.

The 3rd week the ambassadors were divided up and taken to different cottages and cabins in Wisconsin for rest and relaxation before going home. My cabin was the only one on Ross Lake so I had a most amazing experience. Waking up to the sounds of nature's orchestra was indescribable. Watching the sunset from our dock with wine and cheese, canoeing and fishing, the crackling fires, playing speed scrabble, grilling steaks, nature hikes, star gazing, and watching the beavers build their dam were just some of the moments I will always remember. It was one of the best experiences of my life, with wonderful new friends, peace, and nature.

October 2010 Exchange to Mexico

incoln has been assigned an exchange with Filobobos, Mexico for 2010. Where's that, you ask? Originally the Friendship Force of Altotonga, Filobobos is a new club including the small cities of Altotonga, Perote, Atzalan, and Tlapacoyan. These appear to be near Xalapa (Jalapa), the capitol of the state of Veracruz.

Located in the Sierra Madre Mountains, Filobobos is about 200 miles east of Mexico City. At 6,600 ft. above sea level, the temperature is pleasant year-round. The area is known for whitewater rafting.

An informational meeting will be held on Sunday, February 7th at 2:00 P.M. at Gere Library, 2400 S. 56th Street. Applications may be found on the Friendship Force website, thefriendshipforce.org, or by contacting either of the exchange co-directors, Pat King, pking4@neb.rr.com, or Julie Albrecht, jalbrecht1@unl.edu.

The exchange is planned for the last week of October, 2010. This should coincide with the Lincoln Public Schools' holiday in case parents/grandparents would like to take older children/ grandchildren, especially those interested in history or speaking Spanish. A passport will be needed. Planned activities include a welcome party; visits to the Archeological Museum, State Congress, an old "hacienda," and a coffee plantation; visits to the Archeological and Ecotourist Zones with rafting possibility; and an optional tour to the Totonic ruins of Tajin.

A 3-4 day pre-exchange tour is planned to include the ancient Aztec city of Teotihuacan, Xochimilco floating gardens, the National Museum of Anthropology and the Folkloric Ballet in Mexico City; the silver city of Taxco; and Puebla.

A post-exchange tour to Oaxaca will include the Zapotec ruins of Monte Alban and Mitla and a night visit to cemeteries to view Dia de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) decorations, foods, and activities. The Day of the Dead includes All Saints Day and All Souls Day, and is a major fiesta throughout Mexico.

The cost of the exchange will be \$1,400 plus airfare. Ambassadors may arrange their own airfare using the airline of their choice and frequent flyer miles if they have any.

Open World Alumni in Tajikistan Organize Charity Drive For Underprivileged and At-Risk Children

uring their trip to the US, the Open World delegates on "Child Protection" received a \$50 donation to help Tajik children. After their return to Tajikistan, the group approached UNI-**CEF/Child Protection Depart**ment in Dushanbe to help identify the groups who would benefit most from the donation. UNICEF conducted the needs assessment and identified four institutions that needed help.

Shortly afterward, Anora Akbarova, the facilitator of the Child Protection group, and Program Coordinator for Open World in Tajikistan, announced the beginning of a charity drive for needy children. As a result of this very successful charity drive, which involved both the local and international community, clothes for boys and girls were collected, and the alumni received a generous donation from the Rotary Club in Dushanbe, as well as money donated by private individuals.

On November 26, 2006, the Open World Alumni together with facilitator conducted charity events at four needy institutions. All the visits were conducted with the technical and information support of UNICEF/Child Protection Department.

- 1. The Reception Center for Minors is an organization dealing with street and neglected children of 3-14 years. Children received new sneakers donated by Rotary Club in Dushanbe and clothing from the charity drive. "Now I have a jacket for winter. It would be nice to have socks also" said one boy in Tajik.
- 2. The Special school for children in conflict with the Law, housing male nonviolent offenders of 11-16 years from poor families. Almost all boys of school received new sneakers and others received clothing. Children were really happy to get new shoes for upcoming winter.
- The Special Vocational 3. School for Minors from Vulnerable Families. This boarding school houses 30 boys of 14-18 years. Open World Alumni purchased 13 chicken and 2 roosters for the school, using the money from charity box. The chicken and roosters were delivered to the Special Vocational School, which already had its own hen house. The chicken and roosters will help the boys to develop some breeding skills and have

some eggs for breakfast.

4. Charogi Hidoyat Center for Girls. The center consists of the Girls Support Service (there were six girls currently living there - victims of violence) and a dormitory for orphan girls who are studying at university and vocational colleges. The OW Alumni had gone to the Dushanbe Textile Factory and purchased 65 meters of fabric (fustian) with the money donated by the Friendship Force of Lincoln, Nebraska. Makhbuba Muhitdinova presented the fabric to the Center's Director. The girls had their first sewing class on December 9 and made pajamas for themselves for winter! Donated clothing was also presented to the psychologist who worked with the abused girls.

At the end of all these events, the Open World group came to the conclusion that it was possible, with activism, "to integrate and implement volunteerism and joint cooperation of state organizations, NGOs and the private sectors in Tajikistan, just as we observed during our trip to the USA."
