## OPEN WORLD DELEGATES FROM AZERBIAJAN

he Open World Leadership Center is sending five young women from Azerbaijan to Lincoln to study "Women in Politics and Civil Society." They will be accompanied by a facilitator to assist them with language and travel difficulties.

The women will spend the week of November 4th meeting elected officials and community leaders, discussing the acceptance of women by the community, and developing methods of increasing women's involvement in their government and community. They will also have an opportunity to observe Nebraska's election process.

The Open World delegates will be hosted by members of the Friendship Force of Lincoln. A committee from the Friendship Force is responsible for planning 40 hours of topical information, meetings, and tours for the women.

Open World, an arm of the U.S. Congress, introduces rising leaders of emerging countries to the importance of legislative functions in creating and sustaining democracies. This is done through the introduction of young leaders to the American democratic governing systems and free market operations.

Senator Ben Nelson is Chairman of the Open World Board of Trustees.

Friendship Force members will have an opportunity to meet the Open World delegates on Sunday, November 4 at a Welcome Party to be held at the Holmes Lake Apartments Clubhouse, 7100 Holmes Park Drive, at 4:30 p.m. The cost, including dinner, is \$8.
