The committee members want to thank all of the presenters and the host families. We felt that the club deserves to see what we include in these week-long visits from the young professionals of these countries, so we are including a synopsis of the two programs in this issue of the Passport.

The theme for the November Open World was "Women in Politics and Civil Society". Since the group of 5 women were from Azerbaijan, our hosts included the journey coordinators for our upcoming trip to that country, Wendy Horacek and Linda Kistler as well as Jan and Bob Sibal and De Tonack.

Our program included an arrival party at the home of Gayle & Milt Bayer with the assistance of Nancy & John Comer. We treated the delegates to the production of SPAMALOT at the Lied center and a Runza Welcome Party at the Holmes Lake Apt. Clubhouse. The educational program included a meeting with Leadership Lincoln, Barbara Bartels of the Lincoln Community Foundation, Senator Adam Morfeld of Civic Nebraska, a tour of the Capitol Bldg and a meeting with Senators Patty Pansing-**Brooks and Senator Anna**

Wishart as well as lunch with former Mayor Coleen Seng.

We included a visit to the Lancaster County Election Office with Dave Shively's help, a meeting with Charlyne Behrens, former Assoc. Dean of the UNL College of Journalism & Mass Communications dealing with the 1st Amendment and the U.S. Constitution and Cheryl Alberts presenting a session on "Fake News" at NETV. The delegates attended the E.N. Thompson Forum on World Issues with speaker Nadine Strossen; and met with JoAnn Martin, CEO of Ameritas. They had an interesting trip to the County Court system led by Judge Holly Parsley and received Honorary Nebraska Citizenship from the Secretary of State. They also had the opportunity to have lunch with a Rotary club and a final breakfast with Friendship Force Lincoln.





Our November program was on "Legislation and Immigration" including displaced citizens of Ukraine. This time our hosts included Barbara & John MacKichan, Phyllis Arth, Bill Behmer & Gwen Meister, Mollie George and De Tonack. The arrival party was at the home of former Senator Vickie McDonald & Larry Harnisch. The delegates toured the Sheldon Art Museum and attended a production of THE KING & I at the Lied.

The Welcome Party was again at the Holmes Lake Clubhouse and the following program was presented during the week. A meeting with lobbyist Matt Schafer, a visit to Appleseed and Becky Gould, a discussion with Dr. Thomas Berg, UNL History Professor, a day at the UNL Law College hosted by Professors Kevin Ruser and Anna Shavers along with several students proficient in the Ukraine language, an Introduction to the Nebraska Legislature by former Assoc. Dean Charlyne Berens, a visit to the Lincoln Public Schools administration bldg. hosted by ELL leaders Laura Salem & Kate Damgaard and a tour of McPhee School given by their new Principal.

This trip included lunches with two Lincoln Rotary Clubs, one at which the delegates gave the program. We also had a breakfast at Billy's Restaurant with many

Outbound Journey to Azerbaijan and Georgia

ur 2019 out-bound journey is to Azerbaijan and Georgia. We will arrive in Tbilisi, Georgia on October 5. This is a great time to visit. It is cooler and pleasant to walk in the Old City and experience the unusual sights and great Georgian foods. Old Town is famous for the natural hot water baths located in convex domes rising over the streams. The Flea Market at Dry Bridge sells Soviet stuff only found in the countries of the former Soviet Union. Archaeologists have traced wine production dating 6,000 BC. Georgia has 521 original

varieties of grapes. We will become wine connoisseurs as we travel by bus through wine country to meet our Azerbaijan hosts at the border.

We will meet the Azerbaijan club at Lagodekhi, Georgia. Our first stop will be Sheki. It is set in a picturesque mountain area. It's a beautiful village inhabited for about 2500 years. We will be staying at the Issam Hotel. Sightseeing will include Kish Albanian church, 8th -9th century Fortress, Sheki Silk factory shop, caravanserais' (Silk Road motels), Juma Mosque and Gileilin Minaret (18th century). All meals, tea parties with Sheki sweets, picnic while traveling, museums. etc. are included in our fee. On our bus ride to Baku, we will be treated with hot tendir bread with cottage cheese and qutabs.

Baku area has been occupied for 4,000 – 5,000 years. At the heart of the city is the Unesco-listed Old City. Other sites will be the ultra-modern Flame Towers, Maiden Tower/Palace of the Shirvanshahs, etc. All museum fees, teas, meals, and bus are included in our fees.
