

Austin, Texas Journey April 2-9

his trip was filled with many firsts for me. I'd never been on an airplane, first trip with Friendship Force, and first time traveling out of the immediate Midwest.

Bright (not so much) and early on Tuesday April 2nd we arrived at the Lincoln Airport to leave on the first flight to Denver. I didn't get to sit with our group, but ended up sitting beside a very nice gentleman, who after I explained it was my very first plane experience went out of his way to make me feel comfortable. The Denver Airport was eye-opening for me, a huge and busy place.

Our hosts were waiting for us with their Friendship Force Austin sign, we grabbed our luggage and headed to lunch at Iron Works Barbecue. The building was at one time an actual iron works business founded by a German immigrant,

Fortunat Weigl, Sr in 1913. His ironwork is still around Austin.

Wednesday found the weather cloudy and chilly as we toured the Texas State Capital. The place was packed with school children, retired schoolteachers, concerned about their retirement pay, and their state representatives. The most unique thing I saw was the door hinges, every one of them says Texas State Capital. After leaving the Capital we walked down Congress Avenue, with Lin giving us the history of the oldest area of Austin. We had lunch at Driskill Hotel, the oldest operating hotel at their 1886 Café with beautiful surroundings and fabulous food! Walked down 6th Street headed toward Austin City Hall to view art exhibits. We ended our day at Scholz Garten, the oldest operating business in Texas.

Thursday found us traveling to LBJ's childhood home



and the LBJ ranch in Johnson City Texas. Learned much about President Johnson's life. Toured his childhood home but was unable to tour the "Western White House" on the ranch because of structural problems. We continued our travels to Fredericksburg an area founded by German immigrants in 1846. We were able to investigate on our own, shopping or whatever we wanted until we ate at Rathskeller's Restaurant, offering traditional German food.

Friday was a free day, we could arrange activities with our hosts. Lois and I went with our hostess, Mitzi, to The Oasis, a restaurant built onto the bluff overlooking Lake Travis. It has approximately 35 outdoor decks, all on different levels facing the lake. It is a popular place to sit and watch the sunset. We went early to avoid the crowd. I sat with my back to

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the view, I get queasy looking down sometimes. In the evening we went to Ester's Follies! It was explained to me that it was very much like watching Saturday Night Live, all I can say is I laughed a lot!!

Saturday was cloudy then raining as we went to the new Austin City Library. It's a beautiful 6 story building that has many areas for specific groups, like small children, adults, and even an area for teens only, a place to get away from younger siblings. There was a rooftop garden with many sitting areas to read, relax, or just look at the scenery. We had lunch at the Cookbook Bar and Café, great food! I had a delicious chicken pot pie! After lunch we went to Dell Medical School which is implementing a new way to train physicians. Saturday evening we had small-group dinners, getting to know the Austin and Lincoln group better while enjoying delicious food and lively conversation.

Sunday was museum day starting at the LBJ Library, learning more about President Johnson. We went to the Bullock State His-





tory Museum where we had lunch and were able to wander around on our own. The most interesting thing I saw there was the actualremains of a wrecked ship, the La Belle, a 54 foot ship that sailed from France in 1684 with 35 people aboard plus supplies they needed. It looked awfully small, I'm surprised it made it across the ocean. Sunday evening was take your hosts to dinner.

Monday we toured Community First Village, located outside city limits, it is a place for the homeless where they can "rent" tiny homes. It is a very interesting concept they have there. They have several businesses on the premises offering jobs to their clients. We had a Tex-Mex lunch and afterwards taking a group picture at mural of Greetings from Austin.

Later in the afternoon we headed to Lake Austin for the farewell dinner (boat tour). It was a gorgeous afternoon to sit in the sun and enjoy the view, many many large homes along the lake and up the bluffs. It was hard saying good-bye to my new friends.

Tuesday April 9th was spent getting everything packed back up and getting to Austin's airport for our return home. Our flight left Austin around three arriving in Denver to wait for approximately four hours. Plus, I met a descendant of one of the five German brothers whose parents sold their house to buy a boat for the sons to sail to the Galapagos Islands in 1938 and told them NOT to return to Europe regardless because they did not want them to fight for Hitler! One of our naturalist guides, she was stunned when I asked her about it because she had never met anyone who knew her family's story, which included a direct connection to Lincoln, Nebraska, where one of the brother's wife had previously met and married Ecuador's most famous pilot before he was killed when his plane crashed.
