

GEORGIA AND AZERBAIJAN JOURNEY - OCTOBER 2019




even members of the Lincoln club and four members of other clubs went to Georgia and Azerbaijan October 1-15, 2019. Georgia was formerly in the Soviet Union. It is bordered by Russia on the North and East, Azerbaijan, Armenia, and Turkey on the South, and the Black Sea on the West. Archaelogiacal excavations have found artifacts from the Bronze Age and Middle Ages in Georgia. The UNESCO sites visited included the Jvari Monastery (590-605); Mtskheta, the "Holy City" founded by the ancient Meschian tribes in the 5th century BC. and the Ananuri castle complex - the seat of a feudal dynasty (13th century). We toured the remains of a cave city that was the one of the most important political, cultural, religious centers of pre-Chirstian-Karti. Our tour guide pointed

out the locations of pagan ceremonies, food storage, etc .We walked or rode up steep cobbled roads to reach the sites. The high locations provided protection from their enemies and were closer to God. Christianity was declared the state religion in 337. We also visited Gori, the birthplace of Joseph Stalin and the Stalin museum. Gori was occupied by Russian troops led by Putin during the 2008 Russo-Georgian War.

We traveled by bus to the Azerbaijan border to meet our Azerbaijan hosts for our second week. A Friendship Force club from Brazil transferred from Azerbaijan to Georgia at the same time. We drove through agricultural areas with a mix of small patches of crops and very large field of corn. Occasionally we came upon cattle grazing freely along

the road side. On the way to Sheki, relatives of our hosts served us their traditional dishes and the children entertained us with their dancing. Many pictures were taken with the grandparents, children and grandchildren. It was a genuine Friendship Force moment. We spent two nights in Sheki. The very narrow streets were a challenge for the bus driver. It took several maneuvers for the bus to make a righthand turn. Sheik highlights were the Albanian Temple/ Church, an architectural example of an early Christian church and the Sheki Khan's Palace, windows were made with multi-colored glass mosaics inlaid into an intricate wooden lattice. An artisan demonstrated how the windows were built without glue or nails. Stone age petroglyphs were seen at Gobustan. The oldest petroglyphs date back to the 12th-8th century BC.

Let's Eat Out

he last LEO for 2019 was held Tuesday October 22 at Tia Letys restaurant on North 27th Street with 15 Friendship Force club members present. Tia Letys (Tia meaning aunt) is run by Leticia Martinaz. Her restaurant has been located in several areas of Lincoln. She started out in downtown Lincoln and moved out by the State Penitentiary then to Lincoln Air Park.

The meal was started out with traditional chips and salsa. We had the choice of a red and green salsa. The menu had both Salvadorian and Mexican food. Papusas which is Salvadorian and also Tia's specialty dish was served with many of the items. It is a handmade pancake size tortilla made from white corn and normally

stuffed with pork, beans or cheese. Curtido, a Salvadorian pickled cabbage in spices was a side to many of the items on the menu. Pasteles are a deep fried Taco stuffed with pork, potato, carrot, and green beans. I had one of Tia's Enchiladas and it was really good; smothered in cheese and

enchilada sauce. Three meat options and a price of \$2.25 made it a great option.

Salvadorian desserts finished off the meal. Empanadas De Platano made of boiled ripe Plantains stuffed with vanilla pudding then deep fried and rolled in sugar was an item that some ordered. Canoa is a deep fried Plantain topped with vanilla pudding and cinnamon. Most desserts we found could be shared by two or three as the helpings were really large. The main dishes on the menu also contained plenty of food to share.

Tia Letys was a great stop and introduced our members to many new Salvadorian foods.

For the first LEO of 2020 we will be going to STUR 22 (21st and South Street) for Caribbean and African food. It will be in March with a

date to follow. Hope to see everyone there as they have a very interesting menu.

It's hard to imagine the life of the people depicted in these drawings. This area was one of the cradles of civilization. Many were fire worshippers. We also saw the temple built by Indian fire worshippers. Later worshippers were followers of Zoroastrianisnm, Hinduism and Sikhism. Mud volcanoes caused by underground gas were nearby. Visitors to Baku will see the modern "Flame Towers" but other parts of the city have old Russian apartments needing repairs. The water was available in one of the apartments a few hours each day. Our hosts were wonderful. I've never seen so much food on a table or eaten so much.
