VIRTUAL OPEN WORLD HOSTED ON JULY 17

ergey Eguy from American Councils arranged a Zoom Conference with the Open World delegates from Russia that were to come to Lincoln in April 2020. Due to Covid-19 the Open World delegates journey to Lincoln has been delayed until it is safe to travel. The Open World topic for our delegation is journalism, media in a democratic society.

The 2-hour Zoom conference helped our Friendship Force planning committee meet the Russian delegates virtually and provided us with insight into what they expected from the program. Speakers included Matt Tucker, Program Manager from Open World Leadership Center and Britton Homes, FFI Regional Support Manager. Arlene Rea, FFL President and

Julie Albrecht, Open World Committee chair welcomed the delegates on behalf of Friendship Force of Lincoln.

Ben Nelson, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Open World Leadership Center also welcomed the delegates (Congressman Fortenberry was scheduled but due to his responsibilities on the Appropriations Committee, he was not able to participate).

The Russian delegates introduced themselvess: Kristina Gireva, Tatiana Kruglikova, Julia Pliskina, Sergey Sotnikov, and Julia Sveshnikova. The Facilitator, Svetlana Devianina stated that she has been to Lincoln two previous times with Open World delegates.

Bylaw Amendments to be voted on at Annual Meeting

Background for proposed bylaws amendments/changes:

In June, FFL President Arlene Rea questioned the leaders of FFI on how to conduct business if we cannot meet in person, especially for the annual meeting. Zooming has been used by your board and executive committee since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Based on direction from FFI and other Midwest clubs, the proposed bylaws changes were recommended to the board by the bylaws committee of PAT KING, BRIAN RIDENOUR and BETTY STARR and chaired by vice-president MAXINE MOUL. For the annual meeting and other meetings of FFL to proceed by virtual means, your board is recommending the following addition/changes(highlighted in yellow) to Article VII (Meetings), Section 4 and 5:

Bylaw Amendments continued

Bylaw Amendments

Section 4. The annual meeting and other club meetings, meetings of the Board of Directors, meetings of the Executive Committee and meetings of any other committee of the Club, whether a standing or special committee, may be held via in person meetings and, if determined by the chairperson of the meeting to be reasonably necessary, may also be held, in whole or in part, by telephone conference, by video or web conference, or through any other methods of electronic communication, provided each person participating in such meeting is able to be heard by and to hear all other participants in the meeting including any participating by any alternative means permitted hereunder.

Section 5. The Executive Committee, any standing committee or any special committee may act without meeting if the action taken is reflected in a written consent or other writing executed in one or more counterparts by all members of the committee. *

*Note: New Article VIII, Section 5 is an adaption of a relatively standard provision found in the bylaws of many for profit corporations. It permits a committee to act by written consent, provided all members of the committee join in the written action. Each can sign separately, or all can sign one document, thus the verbiage regarding counterparts.

In addition, the Board is recommending the proposed bylaws amendments (regarding good policy):

ARTICLE IV – BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 2 (I) To adopt Policies governing activities of the Board of Directors and the Club's committees, provided such Policies are not in conflict with these Bylaws. If a conflict between the Bylaws and the Club's Policies is determined to exist, the Bylaws shall be controlling.

ARTICLE XI - AMENDMENTS

The bylaws may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the club by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of those present and voting. The membership shall be notified of the amendments at least thirty days before the meeting.

Amendments to the Bylaws shall take effect immediately upon their approval unless a later effective date is specified at the time of adoption.

A copy of the approved Bylaws will be sent to FFI by the president.

These amendments must be presented to the FFL membership in writing at least 30 days before the in-person annual meeting, currently scheduled for September 27, discussed and adopted by a majority of the quorum present. The quorum is 10 percent of the current membership, or at least 12 members.

Virtual Learning: Culinary Diplomacy

s we are not having the regular LEO due to the pandemic, I watched a visual class arranged online by the Sacramento Friendship Force entitled: Culinary Diplomacy. It was hosted by Kelsey Maher who is a Program Manager for Food Specific, which is a nonprofit organization. I want to share this knowledge with my fellow Lincoln Friendship Force members. First off, if you're like me, you thought Culinary what? Actually; we've been practicing some of its elements throughout our programs with international and state exchanges. I'll give you a brief rundown of what it is and you'll see the similarities.

Culinary Diplomacy

I the use of food to connect people from different backgrounds. There are three pillars of this:

Gastro diplomacy

When you associate a certain area with specific foods as sushi with Japan or tacos with Mexico.

Culinary branding

When the agricultural economy is built around a certain food as in Peru with its 50 different types of potatoes.

Citizen diplomacy

This is what the woman hosting this class is involved in. It's more of a one on one

learning experience with others. She went on to tell people how to get involved in this.

How to get involved:

- 1. Visit local restaurants and grocery stores of immigrants. Ask them how they use specific products. (Is this ringing a bell with you Lincoln members? LEO)
- 2. Read or cook your way through cookbooks from other cultures.
- 3. Attend events like Slow Foods East Bay Pop-ups.
- 4. Host dinners for international visitors showcasing local products. (Here's the bell ringing again, folks) So many of us have hosted these types of things. Bruce and I have tried to have Nebraska meals with flat-iron steaks, Bruce's home grown vegetables & relishes I've made, and homemade pies or made in NE pies, etc. People from elsewhere enjoy this; just as you enjoy tasting their normal food fare when you visit other states or countries.

DID YOU KNOW?

ne of the little known facts about The Friendship Force of Lincoln is it is duly qualified under Section501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a charitable organization. That status was obtained through an application filed by some of the early leaders of our club. As a consequence of its status, the club is exempt from taxation of its income, filing only a simple post card type of return with the IRS. Contributions made to the Club may be deducted by the donors to the same extent and in the same manner as donations made to other charitable organizations, such as the Salvation Army, any of the numerous medical related charities (American Heart Association, etc.) or educational foundations such as the UNL Foundation. If you so choose, the Club could even be designated as a beneficiary in your estate planning documents.

Once trained online by Lincoln Literacy, JOB MENTORS will contact their assigned Lincoln Literacy student and then work with him or her through Zoom or another online platform

and offer encouragement and technical assistance throughout the job search process. Lincoln Literacy's fall session begins August 31st so a prompt response is required.

Sample **Job Mentor** tasks include:

- Reviewing resumes
- Advice on cover notes or letters
- Interview practice and tips
- Suggestions for places to apply if the mentor has any ideas
