n my last President's Message, in the May issue, I was optimistic about our future. Because people were getting vaccinated for COVID and the number of cases were significantly de-


creasing, we began to meet in person for LEO (Let's Eat Out) and Saturday breakfasts with some limitations.

he Lincoln Friendship
Force held the August
2021 Let's Eat Out (LEO)
at the Oven East. Twentyfour members and two
guests enjoyed excellent
ethnic Indian and Bhutanese
foods. The Oven has three
locations. The Oven in the
Haymarket, The Cellar below
the Haymarket location and
Oven East.

The food is a style from Northern India cooked in a clay oven called a Tandoor. The menu had 12 different types of breads to choose from. Carlene and I had the garlic naan and it was excellent. The menu included items from the country of Bhutan, a small mountainous Asian country bordered by

India and China. Bhutanese Specialty was a mixture of vegetables, cheeses and your choice of meat. Thimphu Chicken is named after the capital of the Royal Kingdom of Bhutan. It was my choice for the evening and included large pieces of tender chicken cooked in a cauliflower sauce that was smooth and not overly spicy. Carlene had the Lamb Madras which is described as Lamb simmered in spicy coconut milk sauce. The lamb was very tender and had an excellent taste. Our waitress Tashi, a niece of the owner, did a very good job of waiting on our large group.

Owner Ngawang Rinchen migrated to the US from Bhutan in 1978. He had cooked for the Royal Family in Bhutan, Bhutanese and Indian restaurants in New York City and Omaha. In 1988 Rinchen was hired by the Oven restaurant. 1988 was also when the Oven opened in the Haymarket. He has since purchased the Oven.

Our next LEO will be held at Villa Amore for a taste of Italian at 5253 N. 27th Street, on Thursday. October 7, 2021. Bruce and Carlene Keim and Sara Stephenson are the LEO committee members.

FFL's board continued to meet virtually. The monthly

breakfasts and happy hours were also held throughout the quarter, online of course, while three invitations to gather in person for a stroll around Gateway Mall provided for an outing and a chance to see one another "live".

However, overall, reinventing became the new mantra. FFL and FFI have moved ahead in offering the membership numerous ways to connect virtually and to stay in touch with one another within our club as well as across the national organization. Virtual became the keyword. Local members at FFL have shared their past journeys on line. FFI did likewise. Trivia nights became popular, both within our club and in conjunction with other clubs. Additionally

FFI's "Stay Safe While Travelling" whetted our appetites for more "nomadic" days.

The club's newsletter "Passports" came out online on February 2nd and contained, among other things, a breakdown of the membership survey, conducted and collated by Maxine Moul in which about half the club's membership participated. Likewise, about half the members made up gift bags for the Center for People in Need in lieu of our holiday party. Membership for 2021 dropped off about 20% from 2020 leaving the club with 88 members for 2021.

One further innovation rolled out on March 13th, 2021 was FFI's new "my.

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friendshipforce.com". This online tool connecting all members is intended to promote greater privacy, to make communication across clubs more fluid and uniform and complies with current privacy rules. One major benefit highlighted by our president is that this new resource will make web hosting available to local clubs. This will make having a web presence less costly than it has been up to now.

The Second quarter of 2021 saw many of the Covid imposed restrictions being withdrawn or mitigated, allowing all of us, including FFL, more opportunities for in-person events and activities. The second Saturday breakfast at Stauffer's was one of the first events to meet in-person. LEO was quick to follow with its first gathering in over a year in May. A talk was given by the owner of the Afro-Caribbean restaurant, Stur 22, then members took their meals to a nearby park to enjoy picnic together. Breakfasts and LEO gatherings have continued in-person throughout the summer.

Virtual journeys remained a staple through May when finally a journey calendar for the Midwest Region for 2022 became available. Once again members could begin planning and anticipating journeys and hosting inbound guests.

A club sponsored walk in Pioneer's Park attracted a good turn-out in May and the social justice committee, in conjunction with the Unitarian Church, sponsored a live (or Zoom) speaker in June. The club's Newsletter, full of members' stories, was published online in May as was the 2021 Membership Directory. A revised tri-fold, color brochure for our club with updated content and photographs was also made available.

The FFL board continued to meet via Zoom through September. The Annual Meeting has been set for September 19 outdoors. The board continued to urge its members to join the FFI website in order to have access to all the information regarding all of the events sponsored by and undertaken by Friendship Force. FFI also put out a call for nominations to its board of directors.t

Japan: Our First Friendship Force Journey

ur first Friendship Force journey was to Japan in 2004. It was a great trip. A large number of Lincoln members participated, good friends, some now deceased. Members of the Friendship Force of Lincoln were hosted by members of the Friendship Force of Aichi for a week and members of the Friendship Force of Hiroshima for a week.

We flew into Nagoya and we were picked up by our host Yoko Doi and her friend Eiko. Yoko spoke perfect English. She had spent some time in the US, in Michigan I believe, perhaps as a student. We arrived at her home to meet her two daughters and son. Her husband was working out of town and while we talked to him on the phone, we did not meet

him in person. We slept in a room off the main living area on tatami mats. We were awakened one evening by a minor earthquake. We gathered in the living area, acknowledged that indeed it was an earthquake, and returned to bed. It then registered with us why all the wall pictures were situated on the floor rather than hanging on the wall.

Three events stand out in our week with Yoko. She took us to a coffee group, maybe a book group, where we met six or seven Japanese women, all spoke English, and we had a lovely afternoon. It is the only time I have been to an all-women's discussion group. A second event was the evening Yoko left us with Eiko who drove a short distance to a Buddhist shrine. We spent the evening with Eiko, who

spoke some English and the resident monk who spoke no English. We shared a bottle of wine and muddled through the evening as best we could. Somehow, it worked. The third event found us on a metro-train by ourselves going to meet the rest of our group for a day trip to Nara noted for its Buddhist architecture and artifacts. Yoko instructed us to sit in the front train car and when it stops, exit and climb the nearby stairs to the ground level. We were told the group will be waiting for you. We somehow missed the stairs and started walking through the underground tunnel and made it to the next train stop some distance away. There we asked an older Japanese man for directions. He gave us a blank stare. We pondered our situation for a moment when a young Japanese girl, maybe college age, said "You look lost" in perfect English. We said, "Yes we are" also in perfect English. She got us started in the right direction. We walked back and now took the stairs to the ground level. The group was not there. We started walking, somewhat in a panic until we heard a shrill voice coming from behind, "Mr. and Mrs. Comer." We were found and joined the group and made it to Nara. Yoko had a good

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laugh when we returned—a stop at a local mall and a trip to the rest room. American toilets have one lever, and we know what it is does. Not so in Japan. A push of the alarm button brought the security people running to recue my wife who really didn't need rescuing. From Nagoya, it was on to Konu Village in Miyoshi City by train.

Konu, population 3000 in the center of Japan, believe it or not has a Center named for President limmy Carter. Carter has been to Konu several times and is responsible for returning a sacred temple bell removed by the Japanese military during WW II and later donated to the Carter center in Atlanta. Carter returned the bell to its rightful place and the citizens of Konu established a museum and education center in his honor.

We arrived in Konu to find the streets lined with Japanese and American flags. Our first stop was the Carter Center where we were introduced to our host for the week, Sachio Fujiwara. Sachio was a businessman involved in manufacturing Japanese folding screens used to separate spaces or simply for decoration in Japanese homes. They often have elegant artistic designs. Before leaving Konu we were

presented a small screen as a gift to help us remember our host and visit to this small Japanese community. Sachio also imported and sold fine furniture chiefly to China.

Nancy and I and fellow traveler Marilyn Paolini were housed in a home close to the Center that Sachio made available on occasion to his business clients. It was a full house with three bedrooms upstairs. On the edge of the village, a bubbling spring ran near the property lulling us to sleep each night and waking us quietly each morning. As we had the house to ourselves. Sachio's wife arrived every morning to prepare a delicious breakfast. It was from there that we began our explorations each day.

Sachio would drive. His employee Minako, a young college-aged women, helped with the translation. We would be talking with Sachio and he would suddenly call for Minako. He knew some English. She was better but still carried a dictionary just in case. Again, we muddled through.

One day we visited a Buddhist monastery and met the priest, the husband of Sachio's housekeeper. One day we visited Sachio's factory. On another day we visited his showroom, and a resident artist created a small remembrance of the day. Each of us received a small piece of screen that bore the date 9/11. Each was

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different, trimmed in the colors we were wearing that day, and each with an artistic rendition of our name. Yes, it was the anniversary of the 9/11 attack on the US.

The highpoint of the trip was a visit to Hiroshima where the leader of our group placed a wreath at the memorial to the lives lost in the atomic blast. Sachio's mother was one. We visited several on-site museums and walked the grounds near the Atomic Bomb Dome that in spite of being near the center of the blast was not completely destroyed. It was a solemn and prayerful occasion.

Before departing we managed to have dinner with our friend Katsuko, who ferried over from her home across the Inland Sea. Then it was the long flight home and recovering from jetlag. It was fun to relive the trip through the logs of each day's activities provided by those who joined us on the trip.
