Afghan Refugees

here were lengthy delays in getting Afghan refugees here, but they have begun to arrive. We're currently assisting 12 of them, while enrolling more each day. The State Refugee Coordinator says that 68 (adults and children) are expected this week, with 122 more to follow before the end of the year. Some of the refugees we've met have very good English, but most are at a low level.

Since a change in the rules governing Afghan humanitarian parolees, they are now eligible for all refugee services. This means that a significant fraction with young children will not come to Lincoln Literacy and our partner, Southeast Community College -- at least not in the short run -- but will opt for TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families). TANF requires them to be under the management of Equus, a state contractor, and to take 10 hours a week of English at the Center for People in Need, among other things.

Note: Several Afghan refugees will be attending the Holiday Party at the Venue Restaurant private dining rooms on Saturday, December 4 at 6PM. As we become aware of opportunities for our members to be involved, we will keep you informed.

Open World: Russian Media Literacy Group Visit tentatively set for the week of May-13-22

Open World staff are monitoring everything very closely, especially with concern to the Russian programs due to the accepted vaccines issue.

illa Amore Italian Eatery and Wine Bar next to The Country Inn and Suites on north 27th Street was the location of our October 7th Let's Eat Out meeting. Twelve members of the Lincoln Friendship Force club were in attendance.

Nick, our waiter, told us about the restaurant and the menu. Nick was from the small country of Albania. Albania is north of Greece and just across the Adriatic Sea east of Italy. He came to the U.S. to travel and work, starting in Wisconsin. For the last 3 years he has been in Lincoln, working at Villa Amore for the last year. Florim Ramadani is the owner and has had several other Italian restaurants in Lincoln.

The white tablecloths make it seem more formal but the restaurant still has a casual feel to it which al-

lowed for great fellowship and conversation.

The menu had many traditional Italian pasta dishes but also included steaks and specialty pizzas. The entrees are served with a choice of salad or soup and a fresh baked roll. My selection was the meatballs sauteed in marinara sauce with angel hair pasta. I especially liked this dish with the smaller angel hair pasta. I had a beautiful garden salad. But I will say that the soup would have been an excellent choice also.

Let's Eat Out at Randang Malaysian Restaurant

he last Let's Eat Out for this year was held at Rendang Malaysian Restaurant located at 27th and O Street on November 3,2021. Fourteen Lincoln Friendship Force members attended what is described as the first and only Malaysian restaurant in Nebraska. The parking lot for Rendang is on the north side of the building and with rush hour traffic is easy to miss, causing extra time to get there.

Our waiter told our group that Rendang has been open for about 6 months. He described Ma-

laysian food as a fusion of Chinese, Malaysian, and Indian cuisines. The main ingredients in Malaysian foods are shrimp paste and coconut milk. The menu at Rendang is smaller but included entrees that were prepared to perfection and had a colorful presentation. Most entrees included a type of rice and fresh vegetables like cucumbers or tomatoes. I ordered Hainanese Chicken. It was steamed chicken served with chicken flavored rice. A house chili sauce, soy sauce and chicken soup were served on the side. Hainanese chicken comes from Hainan, China, a tropical island at the southern

tip of the country. It is also associated with Singapore, Thailand, and Malaysia. The Hainanese chicken was superb and this is a good selection for someone looking for a not so spicy dish.

The menu included several drinks. Milo Dinosaur was one of the drink selections. It is an iced chocolate malt beverage topped with milo powder. The KL Sunrise, a mocktail made of mango and lychee juice looked like an interesting combination.

Desserts were also part of Rendang's menu. Some of our members tried Tau Foo Fah (soybean pudding) which is a Chinese dessert made with very soft tofu with a clear or brown syrup.

The next LEO will be March 2022. Look for details next year.

n 1980, I was a young stay at home mom to 2 little girls. A friend of mine was involved with the Mayor's Committee for International Friendship. She asked me if we would be willing to host a young lady from Japan for a few days and we said yes. We enjoyed that experience so much, that when I saw an article in the paper soon after about a new organization called Friendship Force, I decided to investigate. Although at that time, we couldn't afford to travel abroad, we signed up to host on that very first exchange from Newcastle, England, and that started a lifetime

of adventures with international visitors from FF and several other organizations. Our guests from Newcastle were a recently widowed lady and her young adult daughter. We enjoyed them so much and kept in touch at Christmas over the years. In the last few years, I have been to visit Dorothy, the daughter, who now lives in The Netherlands, twice. We skype frequently and are fast friends!

Our next FF hosting was the Colombia exchange in September of 1983. We hosted a mom and her 2 young daughters. Although we did not speak Spanish, and they did not speak English, with the help of dictionaries we communicated quite well, and had a great week. FFL had a short class in Spanish for us before they came, which helped. I felt "fluent" in Spanish by the end of the week. LOL! Sadly, we lost touch with them after a few vears.

In the fall of 1984, we travelled on our first and only exchange, to New Zealand. It was a perfect match! My husband wanted to learn to scuba dive, and our host husband was a scuba diving instructor. In one week, we were like family and have kept in touch with them ever since. He died several years ago, but his wife and I communicate frequently via video chat. They came to Lincoln a few years before he died, and I am hoping to get back to NZ to visit her. I was planning that in 2020, until Covid intervened!

In the fall of 1991, I hosted a family with 2 young girls from East Germany. It was their first trip to a non-Communist country. We had a wonderful week with them. The husband really bonded with my toddler son! I had not seen them since, just kept in touch at Christmas, until a couple of years ago when the wife, (her husband is now deceased), her grown daughter and family came to Orlando and asked me to come join them. This family has been on 25 or so exchanges all over the world with FF. We reconnected like we had never been apart, and I am planning to go visit them next summer.

International hosting has given my family lifelong friends from all over the world! I am so grateful to have had these experiences! My daughter told me once that hosting international people is one of the most important things that has shaped her life. We all learned that first impressions are not always accurate, that people are the same all over the world, and that we have more similarities than differences! "Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me!"

Dear FFL members and friends,

he pandemic has been difficult for all of us. It has been particularly difficult for non-profits such as Friendship Force International. FFI relies on dues and journeys to maintain the services that we enjoy.

FFI exists today because of the incredible generosity of members and clubs, operational grants from the US, UK, Australian and French governments, and some major belt-tightening. **Despite the setback, FFI has been able to:**

1. Launch a broad series of FF Virtual Experiences

- 2. Develop a new multi-lingual website
- 3. Send timely, multilingual, communications to all members through my.friendshipforce.org
- 4. Plan our first post-pandemic World Conference in 2023.

To continue positioning FFI for a stronger future, the following changes have been recently approved by the FFI and FFL Boards of Directors:

- 1. 2022 dues: FFI (\$25, a \$5 increase, per member) and FFL (\$20, no increase) dues are \$45 per member or \$85 for a household. FFL dues deadline is December 31, 2021 while FFI 2022 dues are payable in January, 2022.
- 2. 2023 dues: FFI (\$30) and FFL (\$20) dues are \$50 per member or \$95 for a household. FFL dues deadline is December 31, 2022 while FFI 2023 dues are payable in January, 2023.

The FFL Board had set the dues for 2022 before the Annual Meeting at \$40 per person and \$75 per household. The FFI Board announced the dues change from \$20 to \$25 after that, so we are \$5 short per member. If you have already paid your 2022 dues at the \$40/\$75 rate, please send \$5 per member. If you have not paid yet, please pay at the \$45/\$85 rate. If you have already paid at the \$45/\$85 rate, thank you. Send your check before December 31, 2021 to: The Friendship Force of Lincoln, Milt Bayer, P.O Box 30334, Lincoln, NE 68503.

Note: In the future, we will need to collect dues by December 31 before the following year so we are current with FFI.
