Diversity Committee Focuses on Muslim Community

The goal of Friendship Force of Lincoln's Diversity and Community Service Committee is to support Friendship Force International's mission to provide unique experiences to connect in ways that transcend boundaries that separate people. To prepare to travel nationally and internationally and to host guests in our homes, we cannot think of a better way to learn about other cultures than to really get to know our neighbors in the Lincoln community. The Committee's specific focus for 2024 is to become better acquainted with some of our Muslim neighbors in Lincoln. We will be introducing information and opportunities to learn more about our Muslim neighbors as the year progresses.

In years to come we hope to learn about additional cultures by spending time in conversation and sharing food and cultural experiences. The more we learn and grow, the more prepared we will be to be effective ambassadors and hosts within the Friendship Force organization. It is our hope that some of our new friends will choose to join Friendship Force of Lincoln and further enrich our group through their membership.

Here are some guidelines for visiting Muslim homes, hosting Muslim guests, and visiting a mosque that were learned after visiting with a member of the Muslim community.

About hosting Muslim guests:

Be aware of prayer times (see Page 4) and, if possible, schedule around them.

Be aware of Ramadan dates as they change each year (see Page 4). Know guests will remove their shoes.

Know that not everyone will adhere strictly to arrival times so plan a buffer time of about one-half hour for appetizers or conversation prior to sitting down to the meal.

In greeting, nod or shake hands with men. Do not hug or embrace men. Women can greet women as their comfort level and relationship defines.

Guests may be unaccustomed to animals (especially large dogs) in the house. Dog saliva is considered impure.

About serving food to Muslim guests:

Do not serve pork as eating pork or anything made with pork products is haram (unlawful and forbidden in the Quran/Qur'an/Koran).

All other meat served must be halal (lawful or permitted) and slaughtered per the methods prescribed under Islamic law in order for guests to be comfortable eating it. Make sure meats are cooked well done (no pink). (See page 5 for an opportunity to visit a halal grocery store, plus Costco has a halal meat section in the freezers).

Vegetarian fare is fine.

Do not serve alcohol. Muslims do not drink alcohol, in general.

About visiting in a Muslim home:

Remove shoes at the door.

Do not take alcohol as a gift. Flowers, chocolates, nuts, and candies are appropriate.

In greeting, nod or shake hands with men. Do not hug or embrace men.

Women can greet women as their comfort level and relationship defines.

Know about Ramadan. Be aware that fasting from food and beverages, including water, is from sunup to sun down during the holy month of Ramadan (in 2024, Ramadan is from March 10th – April 9th). Ramadan fasting does not apply to the young, elderly, ill, nursing mothers, or women menstruating. There are expectations of giving to those in need and the poor during Ramadan.

Learn about the Muslim and visitor protocols while visiting a mosque in Lincoln. Be aware that women don't have to go to the mosque to pray so you may see more men. Be aware that men and women do not sit next to each other in a mosque.

Other important things to note:

Calls to prayer are five times a day:

- Before sun rises (about 6:25 a.m.)
- 12:00 noon
- 3:00 p.m. (changes with the season)
- Sun set (about 5:00 p.m.)
- Evening (about 6:30 or 7:00 p.m.)
- Friday at 12:00 noon is a very important prayer time so try not to schedule an invitation or visit at that time.

Muslim traditions:

- Wash before prayer
- Remove shoes at the door or at identified place
- Women cover hair
- Modest loose attire (pants/long skirts and long sleeves, no shorts or sleeveless shirts)
- Areas where men and women pray are separate

Non-Muslim guest expectations:

- Modest loose attire (pants/long skirts and long sleeves, no shorts or sleeveless shirts).
- Remove shoes at the door or at the identified place. Women may not be required to cover their hair, but still take a scarf.
- Silence cell phones and be quietly respectful.

Welcome New Members Gary and Karen Heusel

Q: Which is more important – the Journey or the Destination? A: The companion.

Gary and Karen Heusel (pronounced hi-zil, with a long i) have been travel companions for 48 years of marriage, starting with their honeymoon in Hawaii. They met working for Cooperative Extension in rural Illinois counties. Their jobs involved establishing and improving 4-H clubs but also included making international travel opportunities available to high school and college students and finding host families for 4-H international exchanges from other countries.



Because of the 4-H program, this couple has lived in six states. And because of work assignments, they have traveled to all 50 states and many other coun-

tries. They moved to Nebraska in 1996 when Gary became the State 4-H Leader for Nebraska. Nebraska has a very strong 4-H program which includes the 4-H International Youth Exchange. Nebraska's 4-H International Alumni organization continues to enable 4-H members to go to another country for stays ranging in length from six weeks to an entire school year. Gary has been involved in establishing 4-H in Armenia, Bangladesh, Brazil and Costa Rico.

He worked with the state of Georgia to set up an exchange with Hohenheim University in Stuttgart, Germany. It was on a trip to visit Hohenheim that Gary and Karen visited Kirchentellinsfurt where Gary's great-grandparents were born. They walked into a local pub and asked if they knew any Heusels and the patrons responded, "which ones?" While there are only about 100 Heusel families in the U.S., there are more than that in one German community.

Gary, with Karen's support, has worked with several organizations that are similar to Friendship Force, which brings together people from different countries to learn and be friends. Ask him about The Congressional Office for International Leadership, the Lincoln Council of International Visitors (from 2014 until 2023), Lincoln has hosted more than 300 visitors from dozens of countries) and Partners of the Americas. Gary has served on the Partners' international board.

The Heusels lived in Hawaii for five years. Karen was the Program Evaluator at the Center on the Family at the University of Hawaii. She worked with a grant to decrease underage drinking. Gary accepted the position as State 4-H Leader after the University of Hawaii had gone through two failed searches for someone to take that job. He worked for five years trying to rebuild a program that had been neglected for more than a decade, before recruiting his replacement.

They have hosted travelers from more than 75 countries. That began when they lived in rural Illinois where both Gary and Karen worked with county 4-H programs for the University of Illinois Cooperative Extension Service. Their first experience with hosting was for the International 4-H Youth Exchange program. The international students did not look or talk like the locals. The skin-deep differences became attractions and getting to know people different than themselves was good for all.

Retired Teacher Eloise Hiatt is a New Friendship Force Member

Eloise Hiatt (pronounced hi-at) knows a lot about several unique subjects. FFL members will find lots to visit as you cross paths at events (but probably not at Breakfast and Conversation, as Eloise spends most Saturday mornings catching up on sleep).

Eloise retired from 37 years of teaching with the Lincoln Public School system, just before the main office burned down. She taught in the Special Education Department, with expertise in Assistive Technology. Eloise drove to several school buildings each day, carrying equipment and communication systems to the children to meet their learning needs. This included low-tech options, computers and AAC equipment – as Stephen Hawking used. A fun sidelight of studying speech is that Eloise can speak English with fun regional accents and mimic famous voices.

For many years Eloise was on the board of Sanitary Improvement District #5, serving Cheney, NE. She knows a lot about lagoons, a bit different and a lot larger than a septic system that serves one household. The pipes must be inspected and be free of



tree roots and debris, joints must be maintained, and customers have rules about what is and is not to be flushed. The Cheney sewer system is being paid for through a bond issue. Have you heard talk about Cheney being annexed into Lincoln? Check with Eloise, she will explain a few reasons why that won't happen before the bond is paid.

Eloise also served several years on the Board of the Lincoln Public School Employees Federal Credit Union. She knows about savings and interest and checking and investing, and the value of great customer service. Eloise was elected to the Cheney School Board and served seven years. She was on the Morrill Hall Museum Board the year Archie went up. Eloise has earned her Master Gardener certificate. She particularly loves cottonwood trees.

Eloise and her adult children own and operate A Economy Self Storage, located in southwest Lincoln. She knows about contracts and padlocks, security lighting and cameras, flood plains and the removal of unclaimed items. And she has organized 58 keys so she can find the necessary one.

Eloise sings soprano. If you are traveling by car, the trip is highly improved with Eloise singing show tunes and traditional gospel songs. She is an usher at the Lied Center and especially enjoys musical productions. During COVID she began guitar lessons and continues with self-instruction. She knits scarves. At First Plymouth Church she is part of a group that knits baby blankets and prayer shawls. Eloise has a sign in her home that says, "I like everything old - old manners – old books – old times – old friends." She is a Junk Jaunter and worked 10 years for Those Girls Tag Sales. She continues to bid on paintings, favoring flowers and Bev Doolittle's art.

Eloise was previously in FFL and toured France in 2016 under Laurie-Ann Scott's leadership. Eloise loved Monet's Garden. It was her travel priority and the highlight of her trip.

In FFL, Eloise is looking forward to interacting with FFL members and hosting Ambassadors. She desires to travel to Ireland, Australia and New Zealand. Her family has hosted students from Australia and South Korea while they attended East High. Her "local" travel goals include visiting all the U.S. National Parks. Eloise started this venture by camping in multiple national parks with her family. She is well on her way, with 21 of 63 visited, some more than once. She has also enjoyed National Historic Sites/Monuments/Seashores and Recreation Areas.


